

There is a Club visit to Garden Island on Sunday 20 April. This is a picnic day and naval museum visit, with the chance to shoot video inside and outside, bring and barbeque steaks, sip coffee in the cafe overlooking the Harbour and view First Fleet graffiti.

The site can only be reached by ferry. A 10.15 AM ferry leaves Circular Quay (Wharf 4) for Watson's Bay and Garden Island is the first stop. Aim to be on that ferry. For latecomers, there are ferries at 45 min. intervals The last return ferry is at 4.15 PM. Entry to the museum is by \$5 'donation'. There is lift access to the upper levels of the public area, including the spot

where the barbeques are located. This is a B.Y.O event for both food and drink as far as the barbeque goes. Bearing in mind the ferry travel, a small esky or other food container is indicated--- we can

The Public Access Area of Garden island contains 150 years old heritage gardens and scenic







picnic areas. There are views to the Opera House (framed by the gardens), to Rose Bay and to Watsons Bay. From this vantage point, all traffic on Sydney Harbour was controlled and the controllers building remains. The Royal Australian Navy Heritage Centre on the site houses artifacts dating back to 1788. Within the building that houses the cafe there are historic whaling boats and the core (control centre) of one of the Japanese midget submarines that raided Sydney Harbour in 1942. This is appropriate because the Garden Island naval complex is named H.M.A.S Kuttabul after the ferry on which naval ratings died when it was stuck by a midget submarine torpedo – a torpedo intended for the U.S battlecruiser Chicago.

Within the Public Access Area, we will be guided by volunteers (who meet the Ferries) and will be rubbing shoulders with serving naval personnel who frequent the café or play on the oldest lawn tennis court in Australia. It is okay to talk to the natives, provided we don't follow them through the electronic and other gates that divide the secure areas of the naval base from the Public Access Area.

We can shoot video in the Naval Heritage Centre and the Public Access Area generally. The Heritage Centre includes a full ship's Bridge and a working submarine telescope that lets viewers locate 'targets' on the Harbour (bring your submariner's beanie or naval cap?) We are not having a formal video shoot, but this is a good opportunity to try out video and audio equipment in company and to create clips that may result in a video record of the event.



As there are extensive covered areas and a well stocked cafe, this club event will go ahead whatever the weather—fine weather would be ideal, but the Harbour as viewed through the extensive windows of the cafe area looks great even in storm mode.

Another reason for Joining our club...

Thank you guys for warning us about the "life is beautiful" virus. Our member's email network is very good at alerting the rest of the membership of such impending news, be it good or bad.

This shows that we do use anti virus programs but not the anti spam detector, otherwise you would not have received this hoax.

Spam is a daily time waster, it even forces people to change email address and ISP, the rest of us have to amend our address books!

Changing ISP will not help anyway as spam will restart as soon as you get your new email address, spam is prolific, it has to be stopped some other way.

Complaining to your ISP will not help either, they simply can't cope with the million daily spams. Optus spam filter only take out 1% so a community solution is required.



February Focus Night "Know your camera" covered new first time users and experienced members. We had presentations on Middle to high end "Prosumer" cameras through to the "Happy Snapper" for recording the Grand Children and overseas travels.


Each camera chosen by the members presenting on the night was to fill a niche in their requirements whether it was for professional video production or just recording a family event. It seems obvious but anyone

upgrading their camera or a first time user has to address the basic question: What do I want to do with this camera. It was within this framework the discussions and presentations took place.

Peter and Stev Henne discussed and demonstrated some of the Pros and Cons of the Sony and Cannon professional level camera's the emphasis was on how much and how easy it was for manual control of such functions as aperture, shutter speed, focus, white balance, etc. The two cameras were in a similar price range. The Cannon could be programmed via a SD memory chip that enabled the operator to emulate the controls of other camera's this made it easy for the operator in multi camera shoots as all the controls operated in similar manner.

Jim Whitehead presented the "Happy Snapper" camera, which was chosen for easy of use relying on the automatic functions to give a reasonable picture under normal lighting conditions both inside and outside. The Sony camera had a reasonable optical zoom it can be argued anything over 8 times requires a tripod which is cumbersome to carry on the overseas trip. The camera is small enough to carry without attracting attention in some of those locations where you do not want to attract attention and the low light shooting was reasonable for shooting inside buildings.

Eddie Hanham discussed the HD camera that was released when standards were being developed and all manufactures were trying to grab market share to force the acceptance of their formats for compression. some of the problems being slow start up times when shooting action sequences or wild life scenes.



The backend processing (editing software) was lagging the camera market and he experienced problems with the editing. Sometimes this aspect is overlooked when looking at upgrading your camera.

Rob Nercessian talked on some of the newer technologies that manufactures are offering, such as DVD, hard disc, memory cards etc. Some of the Pro's and Con's for these technologies are cost, fragility, compression quality trade off, etc. It was generally agreed that tape will still be around for the near future due to low cost factor and provides an excellent archive medium. He also explained that manufacturers were "Dumming Down" the camera's at the low end to attract the point and shoot user.

The night was well attended and it was an informative forum that provided some thought provoking ideas from people who had experienced the some pitfalls when selecting their camera.


