### **UPLOADING TO VIMEO**

As you know the Club has standardized the method of submitting competition entries. VIMEO is used for transmitting the entry content to the competition manager and then on to the competition Judges. Vimeo also serves to hold the library copies of all present and past entries submitted to the Club.

#### The Vimeo website provides the following advice.

A codec is the format in which your video will be encoded. Vimeo accepts most major video codecs. However for best results we recommend using H.264. If you're uploading High Definition (HD) video, choose the High Profile H.264 setting instead of Main Profile.

To make your uploads extra smooth, choose the following advanced settings whenever possible.

Closed GOP CABAC (to reduce your file size)

#### What is "H.264"

It is a next-generation video compression format. H.264 is also known as MPEG-4 AVC. Developed for use in high definition systems such as HDTV, Blu-ray and HD DVD as well as low resolution portable devices such as Sony's PSP and Apple's iPod, H.264 offers better quality at lower file sizes than both MPEG-2 and MPEG-4 ASP (DivX or XviD).

Apple has official adopted H.264 as the format for QuickTime. It is also one of the formats chosen to be supported by both high definition DVD standards, and is destined to be the future standard format for Blu-ray. Even AVCHD, the consumer format offered by the same people behind Blu-ray and for use in camcorders and Blu-ray recorders, uses H.264 as the main video format.

 $\rm H.264$  is sometimes referred (erroneously) as  $\rm x264 - \rm x264$  is the name of a popular freeware encoder for the H.264 format. H.264 is also sometimes referred to as MP4, again this is technically incorrect. MP4 is a container format much like AVI or MKV and it can be used to "house" many compression codecs, not just H.264. MP4 should not be confused with MPEG-4 video either.

### How you can use H.264.

Complete your edit in your NLE so that it is ready to submit for judging. Follow the NLE instructions to export (or share) the Video. On most normal NLE's, one needs to mark the in and out limits of the work to be exported, complete all rendering of effects and compositing. When export is selected a dropbox appears with various selections for you to make produce the media format you require. Look for H.264 and watch progress as the movie compresses in to H.264 format.

Your completed file should play in "Quick Time".

### **GoPro Hero4 Black and Silver Review**

The new GoPro Hero4 Black and Hero4 Silver are two of the very best action cameras you can buy.

The GoPro Hero4 Black, at \$679 and the GoPro Hero4 Silver, which is \$181 cheaper are identical from the front.



The Black's claim to fame is an ability to shoot 4K video at 30 frames per second, and 1080p video at 120fps (for some very sweet slo-mo.) The Silver's processor is a bit slower, so it can't manage those higher frame rates, but the optics, the image sensor and everything else looks just as good. Basically, if you're shooting 1080p at 60fps, the two are indistinguishable.

Oh, except that the Silver has an LCD screen which is very handy for lining up shots and review footage on the fly, which is nice for adjusting settings because it's touchsensitive too. It's a bit counterintuitive that the flagship Black edition is the one that doesn't have the screen.



The waterproof housing that comes with both cameras is rated down to 39 metres deep, which should be more than enough for all but advanced-level SCUBA divers.

For most consumers, the Hero4 Silver edition is probably the better pick. You probably don't need 4K video at 30fps, or 2.7K at 60, or 1080p at 120, or 720p at 240. I mean, they're

awesome, but you can probably settle for a little less resolution and a little less speed.

For that compromise, you'll save \$US100, and gain a very handy touchscreen and a bit of battery life.

It's also worth noting that Sony's 4K Action



Cam (X100V) is just around the corner and gunning for the Hero4 Black. It costs the same and has a lot (but not all) of the same shooting modes, plus stabilisation and GPS.

#### Ami's Note:

Having the touch LCD allows for easier reconfiguration of this camera from Camera to Video to Time Lapse or Burst and the different speeds (15/325/30/50/60/100/120/240) and from Super-Wide to medium to Narrow etc. The LCD screen also allows you to frame your shots/video...

# Canon's Having Another Shot At Mirrorless With The Nifty New M3

Wave goodbye to the Canon EOS M: there's a new kid on the block. It's called the M3, and it's a gorgeous little thing featuring a 24.2-megapixel sensor, 49-point auto-focus system and powered by a DIG!C 6 image processor.

On the back of the camera, you'll find that a 3-inch pop-out touchscreen dominates the affair, while on top a pop-up flash is nestled in the far left. There's no EVF to be found, but you can buy it as an optional extra.

It's shipping in April in three different kits: Body only, body + EF-M 18-55 IS STM lens and body + EF-M 18-55 IS STM and EF-M 55-200 IS STM lenses. We'll know prices closer to launch.






# More books from the new library


Unlike traditional film production digital films require producers to employ a different pre-production process.

Part One focuses on generating visual ideas that are ideal for digital production and creating a short film script.



Part Three explores the different production environments of DV, 2D and 3D, and how they shape the telling of stories based upon the technological strengths of each style.






The Committee meets on the FIRST WEDNESDAY of each month. Members are always welcome to attend, and for meeting time and venue, see any committee member.
