

Competition Corner

With Mike Elton Competition Manager

At the next meeting we are going to make more of the presentation of awards in the latest competition "The Chase". We are going to ask entrants to tell us the BACK-STORIES. How and why they filmed their entry and any issues regarding the production. What went



wrong and how would they change the way they went about filming what they did. Editing issues and production glitches to be discussed.

Continuing our recent discussions of judging (and with permission of the entrants we will read out some useful crits from our judges). The judges will continue to be and will remain anonymous.

Already we have chosen our competition subjects for 2009. To give you some time to plan your next year entrees.

- #1 Open but will include yellow. This will be due in January.
- #2 My home town/suburb. Due April
- #3 Chroma-Key. Due June
- #4 A Screenplay. Due August
- #5 Transport a 30-second special. Running concurrently with No 4

There might well be changes as it gets nearer to next year.

Before entering competitions read our web sight to make sure your entry is correctly prepared and in the right category. Entries need to be on MiniDV although Digital Hi8 would be accepted. Remember 3 copies are made from each to send to the judges. Don't forget to have a queuing leader or preroll or at least 10 seconds duration to proceed the entry. There should only be one entry on each tape and no other video.

Music Video

Not every video that contains music is a music video! Even if the video is about music or musicians.

We still are having some discussions about Music Videos and what they are. I think people got spooked when they saw an example of a music video shown last month. Despite not everyone one appreciating the skills that went into that example, this was without a doubt a Music Video. Not every music video has to be an assembly of mixed images. A music video can include travel if that matches the music. Even documentary subjects if these match the criteria. That is the music is all-important. The images are there to illustrate or illuminate the music. It should do it in an exciting way allowing us to use many varied effects. Multiple images, colour changes, speed alterations anything that enhances the music.

A basic difference is that a music video lasts only as long as the music. Just images and music.

There is no dialogue unless its part of a song. A music video can but doesn't have to be cut to the beat.

Photography is all-important. And music videos shot correctly are not a lowering of standards but a wonderful opportunity to create.

If you photographed a few scenes and cut the results to the music and the scenes fitted and enhanced the music that can be a music video too. Where a music video in different from other types of videos is that you start with the music and add the pictures. Whereas with every other style of videoing you add the music last unless it is a Music Documentary where music is involved but if this is shot as a documentary it should be regarded as one.

Definitions on the web:

A music video is a short film or video that accompanies a complete piece of music most commonly a song. Originally made and used as a marketing device. Most videos use a range of styles of filmmaking, including animation; live action, documentaries, and non-narrative approaches such as abstract film.

A music video is a filmed or videotaped rendition of a recorded song. The work often portrays musicians performing the song or includes visual images interpreting the lyrics.

FOCUS NIGHT 12 AUGUST - TRAVEL VIDEOS

Mike captured the most beautiful gardens and blossoms being enjoyed by quite a few visitors and locals, in fact thousands of them. In true Japanese style the blossom gardens are illuminated at night and decorated with



Japanese lanterns, well what other style of lantern would you get there. Nicely done Mike.

Jim Whitehead shared some of his adventure to the wilds of South Australia. Quite remote and only reached after quite a long flight in a smallish aeroplane, followed by a bit of scrub bashing in land Cruisers. Jim managed to capture a bit of the flora and fauna and showed us that the dry and empty desert is not so empty after all. Quite surprising what manages to survive there in spite of the conditions, even tourists in splendorous accommodation.

Ernst our Hong Kong country member was visiting and brought along some video of a trip to Buhutan which is a fairly remote country in the Himalayas. Despite the remoteness a local entrepreneur has created a most beautiful hotel built in traditional architectural style, with extremely ornate and rich carvings on almost every



surface externally and internally. The result is amazing despite the difficulty of moving people, equipment and people around this very mountainous small country. The difficult road condition became apparent as we travelled with Eric around the small nation. Thanks Eric for such and interesting insight into a country many of us had never even heard of.

John Maher took us on a pilgrimage to a Roman Catholic precinct in Japan of all places. The establishment is the home of a miraculous statue that actually sheds tears. Now we did not see too much of this miraculous statue of the Virgin Mary as photography is not allowed. Despite travelling all that way to visit John was well received and had a great day out and enjoyed the train journey immensely. Well done John.

Phil Brighton has been transferring his old eight mm film onto DV tape and adding a bit 2000's commentary as appropriate. He entertained us with a scenic trip around the Durban area made some 40 years ago. Phil's film making skills obviously go a long way back as not only was the quality of transferred image pretty good the content was jolly interesting too. Thanks Phil just shows what a bit of perseverance on the transfer rig can produce to preserves those irreplaceable memories on film.

We finished off the evening with some video taken by yours truly in the Loire Valley France. Lots of Chateaux and nice scenery in the area, unmarred by the presence of a large atomic power plant right in the heart of the valley. Very interesting visit to a large underground cave to see champagne being produced and bottled. The real interesting part of that visit was the tasting, sorry the video could not really so that bit justice. Those interested will just have to go there.

Well we will have another Travel Night early next year so get your holiday videos edited so that you can take part and show us how its done and also what you did.

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
Dick Collingridge 94409933, has just told me that he has a complete

- L Cuts and J Cuts

An L cut (or J cut), also known as a split edit, is an edit transition from one shot to another in film or video, where the picture transition does not occur coincidentally with the audio transition. This is often done to enhance the aesthetics or flow of the film (for example - a conversation between two people can feel like a tennis match without L cuts. L cuts allow the audience to see the reactionary impulse to speak, or the aftermath of speaking rather than simply the act of speaking.)

The name of the cut refers to the shape of the cut pieces of the film[1] - the audio track is cut somewhat after (or before) the last frame of video, resulting in roughly L-shaped film ends, as the video and audio parts of film are in tracks, one below, one above, on the film itself.

Example: normal cut

A wide shot cuts straight to a cut away of a chirping bird.





Clip1 audio

Clip2 audio - chirping

Example: J cut

The chirping of the bird is heard before the video transitions to the cut away of the bird.


