THROUGH THE PRESIDENTS LENS

We had a great start to 2011 with a Focus Night about using resources available on the Internet. There are vast resources available through the Internet – a lot of them are free – to show how to do whatever you are trying to do.

One activity is buying video equipment and Peter Frohlich presented a slide show with instruction how to buy wisely on the Internet. Peter will write up an article for the benefit of people who missed out on his presentation.

I presented a video mainly about using YouTube as a Pan Galactic Encyclopaedia. You can always go to Google and ask: "How to apply effect to multiple clips Sony Vegas" and get the answer from forums like Creative-COW.net, www.WonderHowTo.com or Answers.com. By the way, the Cow in Creative COW stands for Communities of the World and you can join a community for

Sony Vegas, Wonder How To and post questions if you haven't seen an answer already posted on the forum.

If you type, for example, "Sony Vegas" into the Search Box in Creative COW or Wonder How To – you'll find fascinating stuff on what else you can do with Sony Vegas. Naturally, you can type in any other Video Editor name.

I found by searching for time-lapse on Canon SX1is about CHDK at http://chdk.setepontos.com/. CHDK stands for Canon Hackers Development Kit. It's a bunch of "good" hackers that find ways to uncover more features in your camera that Canon wanted you to have at the price you paid for this camera...

So I tried but it didn't quite work and I joined the CHDK forum and posted questions and some kind souls helped me make it work.

Similarly, there's a hacker group for Panasonic, working to get more out of the GH1.

Coming back to YouTube, you can find there helpful tutorials on using your Video Editor. Just type in something like "Adobe Premiere tutorials" and you'll see dozens of tutorials. You can be more specific and type in "Adobe Premiere cs5 tutorials" or "Pinnacle green screen tutorial" and you'll find tutorials made by willing volunteers on these topics.





What's more, sometimes you find out from these tutorials about other useful sites. For example, when I watched a video "How to make cool intro w/Adobe Premiere" the guy mentioned 2 other sites – wipidz.com and detonationfilms.com where you can find special effects, cool intros, titles and tutorials on how to make your own... Have a look for yourself.

There are also professional sites like Lynda.com who will let you go through their tutorials on any Video Editor, Photoshop and all the other major software tutorials for a monthly fee which is getting cheaper as our dollar gets stronger....

There is useful stuff on the Internet when you're considering buying new equipment. You can go to sites like au.answers.yahoo.com/ or forums.whirlpool.net.au/ and ask a question or browse through Photography. You'll find people who already have that equipment and can give their opinion. You can also ask to compare, for example Canon 7D and Canon 60D and find people who used both volunteering their advice.





YouTube offers similar service – just type in "Panasonic SD700 review" into the search box. Alternatively, try "gh1 vs 60d" if that's what you're thinking about. YouTube also have "Unboxing" videos. Try for example

"Panasonic AG-AF100 Unboxing"

And you'll find someone in Los Angeles already got one and is happy to show you what's in the box.

You don't have to stop at equipment. You can type into YouTube's search box "directing a video" and find useful information there. Type "storyboard template" or "video script template" into Google and find templates to download.

So the knowledge is there – just ask...

By the way, people at the Focus Night asked me about the software I used to do screen capture video and how to download YouTube videos.

The screen capture software is Cam Studio which is Open Source freeware and for downloading YouTube I used Download Helper, which is a Fire Fox plug-in. The latter converts the FLVs to MP4s as it downloads.

TVS

TVS found some issues with the recent videos that Joy Hruby and they couldn't go to air. Joy Saunders is organising a session with the Station's Technical Guru to find out how to remedy these issues.

Technology News





Okii Systems brought out a USB Follow Focus which lets you snap between four preset points of focus, in addition to controlling digital zoom, adjusting ISO, aperture and shutter speed, and starting and stopping shooting – pretty much a full remote setup.

The controller already sold out now, but you can preorder one from the next batch

Canon brought out the Canon 600D. It's based on the 550D but has flip-out screen, It's also got some of the filter effects from the 60D, like fake tilt-shift, fisheye and others. You can shoot in multiple aspect ratios. A new "video snapshot" feature that fire two, four or eight second video clips.

Canon unveils HR10: its first AVCHD camcorder - the unit touts Full HD capability, a 10x optical zoom lens, and instant AF. It shows that AVCHD is gaining support.

Aiming your GoPro helmet camera and replaying footage is a problem. GoPro started shipping a \$80 LCD BacPac for HD Hero. Contour is working on a viewfinder app for iOS and Android devices that will wirelessly stream video, but that's not here yet.

We have a rumour that Panasonic is developing a new 500mm mirror(reflex) tele lens! According to the source Panasonic is working with some of the Minolta specialist that made that lens. The Panasonic version will have AF (autofocus), O.I.S. (in lens stabilization) and be smaller than the Minolta version. The source doesn't know if that lens will be announced within 2011.

Coming Up:

February 2011 £3.50 From Australia to Alaska Making *The Inventor* - a 4-Star winner from last year's BIAFF **Hollywood Owes** a Debt ... DVDs, Blu-ray and MPEGS An Interview with **Howard Bagshaw ARPS** www.theiac.org.uk Sony's HXR-NX5 - is it all it's cracked up to be?



Australia and Alaska are both vast countries - but the differences between them couldn't be greater.

Australia is an enormous and ancient weather-worn island with few mountains and vast deserts, whereas Alaska is the huge geologicallyyoung extremity of the Americas with rugged snow bound tumbled mountain chains and vast icy tundra. And both countries are a very long way apart!

A long 'plane ride can get you there from Australia - but there is another way!

Each northern summer, the Holland-America Shipping Line repositions its luxury mid-sized (62,000 tonnes) cruise liner, the MS Volendam, from its southern summer cruising around Australia and New Zealand to sail north to cruise Alaska's south western tip - the wonderful 'Inside Passage'.

My wife and I have extensively wandered the world but, today, we are both well into our eighties and my wife is also very disabled, needing a wheelchair to get around. Sailing by Volendam meant that we could actually get there safely and with minimal discomfort!

So, packing my trusty Sony camcorder and a good Olympus still camera, last May my wife and I boarded the Volendam in Sydney, Australia and sailed 16,000 km north for five weeks to reach Alaska's capital, tiny Juneau - enjoying enroute the tropical delights of French Noumea in New Caledonia, then relaxed Fiji, delightful Vanuatu, sleepy Samoa and the four lush islands of Hawaii before our Canadian landfall at wonderful Vancouver Then it was north through the astonishingly beautiful Inside Passage of Alaska.

My Sony camcorder worked overtime, the Olympus still camera as well - to capture superb days at sea, great native lifestyles in each of those wonderful Pacific islands, sophisticated Vancouver and, above all, the majesty, scenic splendour and remoteness of amazing Alaska.

Back home, by 16-hour direct flight to Sydney from Vancouver, I had kilometres of DV tape and heaps of XD cards from my still camera awaiting my urgent attention to actually see the wonderful sights I had only glimpsed through my viewfinder so far!

The results were superb and I edited my DV to produce a long version of the trip but also two ten minute clips of some Alaskan highlights for easier showing to friends.

One was of a superb helicopter trip to land on the amazing Mendenhall Glacier within the huge Juneau Icefield. Exciting and superbly scenic footage.

The other was of a wonderful day spent cruising within the astonishingly beautiful Glacier Bay one hundred nautical miles west of Juneau.

Here we slowly sailed past chains of pristine snow clad mountains mirror-reflected in the almost frozen waters of the bay and then witnessed the almost unbelievable spectacle of the huge Marjorie Glacier calving icebergs into the bay. On tape, the majesty of all this was absolutely compelling and I entered one finished DVD in Australia's version of your BIAFF, the 2010 VOTY (Video of the Year) Festival run annually each November

for almost two decades by Sydney Video Makers Club in the wonderfully appointed Roxy Theatre of Film Australia in Sydney.

This is a very keenly-fought video competition, with many past winners going on to win top awards in major film festivals around the world - your great BIAFF, the Cotswolds, the Golden Knights in Malta, Guernsey Lily in the Channel Islands, in addition to Canada and the USA.

Anyhow, my 'Frozen Fantasy', of Alaska's amazing Glacier Bay has just won the coveted top award in the Travel category at Sydney's 2010 Video Of The Year Festival. The DVD looked absolutely marvellous on the huge screen of the Roxy Theatre - sharp as a tack in brilliant colour and with great surround sound from superb projection by Film Australia's cutting edge projection-room gear. At the closing credits, the packed theatre erupted into sustained applause and I guess that this made me even prouder than later that evening receiving a really nice 'Oscar' from Master of Ceremonies, Eddie Hanham.

But, with the trophy now sitting in pride of place in my home, I still bask in that special glow of 2010 VOTY night!


Focus Night

In response the committee has initiated the following.


The Competitions Manager will publish new criteria as a documentary for the Comp closing on Aug 24.

FOCUS FEBRUARY 2011

INTERNET SUPPORT FOR VIDEOMAKERS

Thirty Club Members attended the February 9 focus night to hear Ami and Peter Frolich review some very interesting ways to use the Internet in support of video production. Some start up problems were experienced because the Club's HD Projector was still in the repair shop fortunately yours truly had his large screen laptop and we were able to arrange it so that the audience could gather around and follow the screen action. Judging by the interested looks the viewing was fine and the information was capturing the attention of those attending.

Ami kicked off the evening opening up some U Tube and Training company sites to see what freebie instruction was available. Sure enough we were able to access some "How to do it" tutorials for editors namely Vegas and Pinnacle. Ami easily found many more applicable to other popular editors.

User forums are another source of information, particularly about equipment and software idiosyncrasies and problems. These forums can be very helpful when you have an equipment operating problem, just go to the appropriate forum and type in "Your problem" and see what others may have found and resolved.

After the tea break Peter got us more into a buying and selling mode, in particular the use of E Bay. Before leaping into E Bay and buying up big there is a lot to be said for visiting sites which review equipment performance and provide ratings based on user feedback and service problems. Once you have your mind set on the item you want its time to get into E bay and start bidding for it. Peter spent a great deal of time on the strategy of bidding. The overall message being to avoid bidding too early, keep up to date with the bidding and then slip in the last few minutes or seconds with a final bid to secure the item and saves paying too much for your treasured item.

The most useful of the sites accessed by Ami and Peter are listed so that you can experiment for yourself.

Quite an interesting evening.

I don't have a creative bone in my body, others are better than me. I don't know enough about the subject. What will others think? I don't have enough experience in the subject. I guess this is the problem all writers have, so they plan to sit down at the word processor regularly every day to discipline themselves to just do it. In video production it means much more because we have a lot more mediums to bring under control such as: the script, cinematography, audio or sound, and editing.



Well I thought of the title for this subject, but why did I chose "harness", good question I say. Well "harness" means first of all to take control. With a horse and cart, one has reigns. Just holding them doesn't get started, we have to tell the horse to giddy up. Same with ourselves.

This session will be a challenging one, not only for me, but I hope for yourself. So come along and learn how to take the reigns of your creative abilities to greater heights.

A SMALL REVOLUTION

As a photographer I always like to carry a small camera in my pocket which I can use to photograph anything I come in contact with on my travels. Now with the invention of HD video and its use spreading to all kinds of cameras and phones I am able to take video records as well. If you saw my two entrées in Voty shown last month you may be interested to know that they were both taken using a Lumix TZ10 camera. Just a couple of scenes were taken on tape using a Canon HV10 video camera. I took this in case the TZ10 was able to take the video I wanted. In fact it was and I didn't have to use the



LUMIX HD AVCHDUM Video camera much at all.

The Lumix TZ10 is easy to use and gives great results. There is no viewfinder you focus and record on the back screen. To which I added a little shade made by Delkin Devices and found at Paxton's. The shade makes it easier to use the screen in bright daylight. The

lens is an Elmar designed by Leica.

In fact the camera is badged as a Leica in some countries. The lens has a pretty rmarkable 25mm wide angle and is a 12optical zoom.



The camera is well stabilised. On the down side there is no microphone or earphone plug but there is an HDMI socket to allow attachment to a TV for viewing video. Downloading from the camera for editing is simple using a provided USB wire. On PC's there is a program supplied with the camera. On Macs you simply download images as you would for stills except they are video recordings with the name MOV added to the number. Video is recorded at 1,280 x 720 Pixels on AVCHD Lite.

With 12.1 effective mega pixels stills are excellent, better than you get from most Video Cameras. To shoot stills you press the shutter release on the right top of the camera. To shoot video you press a red button at the back of the camera and press it again to stop recording. You cannot take a

still image while recording video unlike some SLR's. But its perfect for travel pictures carried in a small case on my belt.

Editing with both Final Cut Express and Vegas works well and you can mix video from the SD card and that from Mini-cassettes. The TZ10 is an excellent go everywhere camera and even has in built GPS system

While I am happy with my Lumix it is still relatively large so recently I bought a 14 mega pixel Olympus 5010. Not quite as efficient as the Lumix but this can be carried in a top pocket and takes good stills and video. I am still testing this camera but it looks good on the surface if not in the same league as the Lumix. Well it did cost a third of the price.
