Our AGM is held on the September Club night.


As per our constitution all committee positions are declared vacant and a new comittee is elected for the new year. We need some new comittee members to carry on the work of Club Stewardship.

Born in New Zealand, June 1931.

Developed a fascination for movie photography at an early age and became the proud owner of a Pathescope 9.5mm movie camera (about the equivalent of a Kodak 'Box Brownie') at 12 years of age. During those war years ('39~'45) movie film was had to get and expensive. It taught me to really think hard before lining up a shot and pulling the trigger. My pocket money didn't go very far!

It was not until I married in 1958 that I moved into Super8 film and soon became bitten by the "Audio" bug - adding magnetic stripe to silent film and attempting all kinds of audio effects and mixing. Mostly without success.

Worked for 30 years in engineering trades (heavy earthmoving equipment service) and a further 12 years as a technical trainer in that same industry where I became acquainted with the use of video as a training medium and emerged from the "sprocket era" into the new wide world of electronic imaging. This was in the early 1980's. Retired January 1993 and continued my interest in video.

Bought my first camcorder in 1992, a Canon EX1-Hi prior to retiring, and joined the Northside Camcorder Club in 1997 (searching for something more challenging than simply filming grandchildren) and remained a member for eleven years

And so, over time, I became interested in video competition, principally documentaries (nature / wildlife) and not drama. I prefer to work solo

rather than in a team.

Graduated from linear editing in 1999 into the Casablanca Non-linear system which, for me opened up the possibility, for the first time, of being able to do some serious work on the audio side of video -making.

Now I am a member of the South West Video Club (Liverpool, NSW), still editing in the Casablanca system and recording with Canon XM-1 and Panasonic GS-330 camcorders.

I am not yet considering moving into the high definition field until this technology becomes more settled, system specifications become unified and prices drop to a range I consider reasonable.


TRAVEL VIDEO NIGHT

It has been decided to defer this popular event to a focus night early in 2010. A poll of members indicates that the subject is more suited to a focus night.


So, all you travel video buffs it gives you a bit more time to edit those travel shots ready for the big night early next year.

The second prize winner was "The Green Screen" by the 10/4 team (with scores of 310 and an average 77.5) which shows how everyone can be a one



FOCUS NIGHTS

"Where is that setting?- I don't have one"

On Tuesday 7th the Club, the Vice President ran the first Focus training night of the Club's second tutorial series. Attendees were encouraged to bring along their camera to follow the presentation on "Camera Basics".

We even had a couple of folk who are in the "what should I buy" mode and I think will have helped them with their decision. The session concentrated on helping folk find all the various settings for manual mode of operation on their own camera and explaining the basic use of the particular functions.

Progress was controlled to match participant progress. There was quite a bit camera manual referring going on. Expressions of "Mine has not got a......" and "what is that for in any case" were heard around the room. By the end of the evening quite a few had performed settings on their camera altering functions that they did not know existed until then.

Feedback suggests that the information session was worthwhile and with some "Home Practice" proficiency levels will rise. Following on from special requests to the President the next three tutorials will include special appeal to the Mac group in the club. The tutorials will be related to "The Mac", and a Mac and Mac software will be used as the demonstration tool. So here is the chance for the Mac enthusiasts to join in on sessions tailored to Mac use.

Get those diaries out and note the dates so that you do not miss out. Here they are **11th August**, **8th September** and **13th October**, just in time for VOTY entry finalisation.

As always with the basics it really does not matter which editor and computer you use, the basics are identical. Remember it is not what camera, Editor or computer you use that produces good video.

It is what you capture and how well you edit it that counts.
